



A Word from the Artistic Director

ince the early '70s, jazz has been my passion. Charles Lloyd's Forest Flower and John Handy's Live At Monterey were turning points. I got my jazz master's degree working at the Keystone Korner in North Beach, where I heard and met the professors of jazz. In fact, that's where I met Cedar, Bobby and Billy.

While living in the East Bay, I was involved in the music presenting organization Jazz In Flight. I created and produced the first five Eddie Moore Jazz Festivals held at Yoshi's Night Spot in Oakland, now going on its tenth year. Simultaneously, I co-produced a series of intimate concerts in my home featuring some truly amazing artists. Many of these artists have become close friends, and this connection has been the foundation for the Jazz Masters Series here in Healdsburg.

When I moved to Healdsburg in 1995, I envisioned the possibility of a jazz festival, and now my dream has come true. This festival will give us an opportunity to see and honor the living masters of the jazz art form. Too many are passing too fast from our midst. This year alone we lost numerous artists, including Michel Petrucciani, Horace Tapscott, Joe Williams, Melba Liston, Jaki Byard and Leon Thomas.

We live in a beautiful area, blessed with the fruits of the earth, great wines and foods. What I felt was missing were diverse cultural experiences. For ourselves and especially the children, we have to create these opportunities. It has been proven through the success of the Jazz Masters Series that there is a thirst for additional cultural enrichment.

connected events throughout the area. Jazz education and music workshops for children must be an important focus.

Tacuma King ~ Children's World Music Workshop

acuma King is a musical charmer and a master educator. Whether teaching a drum rhythm, a dance step, a chant or a respectful appreciation for the rich and diverse cultures around the world, Tacuma makes it fun.

Tacuma was born in Chicago, a potent musical environment. He was fascinated by the big band sounds of Duke Ellington and Sun Ra and inspired by

Chicago's burgeoning community-based music scene exemplified by the Art Ensemble of Chicago. However, Tacuma's major musical influence was his oldest brother James, a free spirit and expert conga player who could be found performing all over Chicago in Latin ensembles. Tacuma and his five other brothers all developed a love of percussion.

Tacuma King studied and played with many of Chicago's finest percussionists and musicologists. He learned to carve his own drums and explored related music, culture, folklore and spirituality. Years later, when Tacuma relocated to Oakland to help care for his ailing brother, he was reunited with one of his influential Chicago mentors, Moshe Milon.

In Oakland, Tacuma's home became a magnet for the neighborhood. Young people would drop in and

learn rhythms and concepts while being entertained. Eventually, as Tacuma became better known in the area, his drumming was sought by dance companies such as

Harambee, Dimensions and Muntu. He started and continues teaching in the Oakland Unified School District and many private institutions. With the help of Jessica Felix, Tacuma began the highly successful Children in Flight percussion/dance workshops in conjunction with Jazz In Flight.

Tacuma traveled to the west African countries of

Gambia and Senegal in 1992. He had a chance to
learn and play with local musicians and to add to his
superb collection of drums and stringed instruments.
More importantly, he was deeply moved by the people and their rich culture, deep faith, humility, patience,
pride and dignity. Tacuma tours around the country
with Keith Terry and Crosspulse. This summer, he will
add to his travels with a trip to Indonesia. – G.A.

Jazz Night at the Movies

enor saxophonist Dexter Gordon gives the performance of a lifetime in the 1986 film 'Round Midnight, directed by Bernard Tavernier. Gordon stars as Dale Turner, an alcoholic American jazzman in Paris in 1959 who is befriended by a sympathetic French jazz fan. Soon he's on the wagon, playing jazz with Bobby Hutcherson, Billy Higgins, Cedar Walton and Herbie Hancock (whose score won a well-deserved Oscar). The music is superb but it's Gordon's naturalistic acting ability that elevates this film into greatness.

Let's Get Lost (1988) is director Bruce Weber's Oscarnominated documentary on the life of trumpeter Chet Baker who came to prominence playing with Charlie Parker and Gerry Mulligan. The immense talent and handsome looks of his younger days are starkly contrasted with footage of his ravaged later life. Yet even in his decline, Baker was a mesmerizing performer. We also hear candid opinions from his mother and all three of his ex-wives in this compelling portrait of a troubled genius. ~ E.C.




May 15-June 25 Healdsburg Jazz "Seen"



Bobby Hutcherson Quartet

He music of vibraphonist Bobby Hutcherson can be inspired by taxi horns honking on a busy street, by the breaking of waves on the beach, and for most of his distinguished forty-year career, by the events and personalities in the life around him.

His first inspiration though, was as a teenager in Pasadena hearing a Milt Jackson record. Bobby describes the range of expression on the vibraphone as "the sound of crystal and wood and silver thread that makes you feel that you've got some money in your pocket even if you don't."

The young Hutcherson teamed up with saxophonist Charles Lloyd and other musicians in the L.A. area to begin developing a sound on the instrument that was distinctly his own. He arrived in New York in 1961 at age 20 to join his improvising peers in exploring new musical territory on the now-classic Blue Note label: Jackie McLean, Hank Mobley, Eric Dolphy, Herbie Hancock, Dexter Gor-



don, Andrew Hill, Grachan Moncur III and McCoy Tyner. After more than forty albums for Blue Note, Hutcherson's

place in the canon of modern jazz is well established. Known for his fire, passion, inventiveness, orchestral approach and judicious use of silence, Bobby's most recent recording Skyline on the Verve label, demonstrates that the mallet maestro is still at the height of his powers.


"Make the bandstand an altar," he said in a recent UPI interview, "make the venue where you play a temple. It is a prayer. Make each time you play the most important time of all, no matter what the gig is, because this may be the last time. Each moment is unbelievably precious." —E.C.

ben not on the road with Cedar Walton or another jazz great, it's likely that drummer Billy Higgins can be found at The World Stage in the Leimert Park area of Los Angeles. Founded by Higgins and poet Kamau Daa-ood, The World Stage is an unassuming store-

front workshop performance space where night after night amazing music is played by young and old alike. This is Higgins' "giveback" to the community and its also his joy to participate in the educational and jam session tradition that ensures the continuity of the art form. "I would just like to see the young people have a chance to be aware of this music," Billy says. "You can listen to it from afar, but if you're not exposed to it on ground level, it's hard to understand what it is." Today the audience will get a taste of Higgins' inimitable personal and rhythmic style that has made him one of the world's most sought-after sidemen.

ton. Growing up during the 1940s in Los Angeles, Billy's talents were honed in the still-thriving Central Avenue scene. As part of the radical Ornette Coleman Quartet (with Don Cherry and Charlie Haden) which was scorned in L.A., Higgins arrived in New York in 1959 to be hailed as one of the masters of the new music, and invited to record with John Coltrane, Sonny Rollins and Thelonius Monk. Since then, his recordings number into the thousands. Critic Loren Schoenberg describes Billy as."...one of the greatest drummers in the history of the music... his pulse and musical personality could charm the birds out of the trees." ~EC

Cedar Walton Quartet


edar Walton has displayed a brilliance, yersatility and creative power over a fortyyear career in music that has made him an acknowledged and highly respected master in the world of jazz.

Born in Dallas in 1934, Cedar recalls listening to the music pouring forth from the jukebox in his father's restaurant, hearing the likes of Count Basie and John Lee Hooker. Traveling musicians would sometimes stay at his home and he'd soak up the sounds and excitement. His mother, a piano teacher, started instructing him at a young age.

After studying music at the University of Denver in the early '50s, Cedar moved to New York in 1955.

Cedar made his jazz recording debut with trumpeter Kenny Dorham. Cedar played regularly with trombone great J.J. Johnson, recorded with John Coltrane, and replaced McCoy Tyner in the Art Farmer/Benny Golson Jazztet in the early '60s.

In 1961 Cedar joined one of the greatest bands of the era, Art Blakey and the Jazz Messengers, and became a partner in its far-reaching influence. This edition, with Wayne Shorter, Freddie Hubbard and



Curtis Fuller, was one of the best in the band's storied history. By the time he made his

recording debut as a leader

in 1967, Cedar was established as one of the finest planists, composers, arrangers and accompanists in all of jazz.

Cedar continued to work with Abbey Lincoln,
Lee Morgan, Hank Mobley, Joe Henderson, Sonny
Rollins and many others. He has appeared on literally hundreds of recordings, many of which are
considered classics. He became the leader of
many stellar groups, including Eastern Rebellion.
While the house pianist for Prestige Records in
the late '60s, Cedar formed a partnership with Billy
Higgins that continues to this day. This alliance
"ranks as one of the great collaborations in modern jazz" (musicHound Jazz), and will be much in
evidence at the Healdsburg Jazz Festival. – G.A.

Ralph Moore

orn in London in 1956, saxophonist Ralph Moore came to the U.S. in 1970. After studying at the Berklee School of Music and playing around Boston, Ralph moved to New York in 1980. He joined Horace Silver's band and played with many other jazz legends. Ralph made his recording debut as a leader in 1985 and has made several highly regarded records.

In 1990, Ralph won emerging-talent polls in both Down Beat and Jazz Times. Since moving to Los Angeles in 1995, Ralph has held the sax chair in the Tonight Show band. He continues to develop in many settings, often with Cedar Walton's Eastern Rebellion quartet.

Although players like Coltrane, Shorter, Turrentine, Stitt and Henderson have informed his vocabulary, Ralph has been called "one of modern music's most melodic and emotional exponents." (Zan Stewart). As one of the busiest tenor players of his generation, Ralph Moore is highly valued for his consistency and professionalism, but even more so for his deeply felt and masterfully rendered creative expression. ~G.A.

Tony Dumas

ony Dumas was born in 1955 and although he has traveled the world making music, Los Angeles has always been his home. He is a busy session player with a remarkable versatility and commitment to bring out the best in any musical situation in which he plays. Although his preferred instrument is double bass, Tony is considered an electric bassist of the top rank. Tony plays plano and guitar and composes as well. Tony has played and recorded with a veritable Who's-Who of the music world, including Joe Henderson, Joe Williams, Art Pepper and Carmen McRae, Freddie Hubbard, George Cables and Toots Thielemans, to mention a few.

Tony had this to say about playing with Cedar Walton and Billy Higgins: "Cedar and Billy have so much worked out between them that at first I was" just trying to fit in. The experience is, to say the least, thrilling. The good thing is that we're past the musical basics. Just expression." —G.A.




The Healdsburg Arts Council

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
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


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
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
